

Prevent Accidental Poisonings

Leftover medications can lead to accidental poisonings.

- There are about 1.3 million emergency room (ER) visits each year for adverse drug events.
- About 50,000 children (5 years old or younger) visit the ER each year because they took medications that were within reach.
- About 9.3 million people misused prescription pain relievers in the last year.

How to Use DisposeRx® Medication Disposal Packets

DisposeRx medication disposal packets are a simple and effective way to get rid of any unused or out of date medications in your home. You simply add water to your medication vial, pour the DisposeRx packet into the vial and shake it for about 30 seconds. Then, you can safely throw the vial into your household trash without worry. Add water until vial is 2/3 full.



Add DisposeRx powder into vial. Put cap back on and shake for 30 seconds.



Throw vial into the trash.
